Q: When does the halacha that we do for talmud torah apply? Take the case of a friend who wanted to learn the Hebrew Bible in English with me from a different point of view than I do. She's learning in a particular order (Artscroll Chumash and then Tanakh with Rashi, then Tanakh with Targum, then Tanakh with Rashi) and she's starting in the English translations for Tanakh in the ArtScroll Chumash -- which made a lot of sense to her. It was a question that arose as to whether the halacha that we do in learning Torah applies to people learning Tanakh in English. It came up mostly as a concern about not mixing in the traditions of the different chumashim that ArtScroll publishes in English. Does the halacha about not mixing styles (in this case, ArtScroll and Targum) apply, or does it only apply to learning with a different person on the same page, not different texts? A: From a halachic perspective, it doesn't matter what an English-learner reads in their translation. Since the Rambam (Hilchot Talmud Torah 3:2), the Rishonim held that anyone may teach Talmud (except the Arizal, and this was widely disputed). Now I
